Project Objectives

- To suggest a more advanced gender mainstreaming (GM) checklist as a new analytical framework and tool in making and evaluating public policies
- To change the discourse on care giving, both unpaid and paid (full recognition of its social and economic value)
 - To build the capacity of grassroots women's groups and to enhance their knowledge and understanding on GM and gender budgeting as well as using various art forms to tell their own stories as care-givers

- The nature/characteristics/types of homecaring have been identified to uncover myths and neglect of home-caring, which are critical in shaping a new discourse
- Major policy directions for the full recognition of home-caring: inter twining policy directions on full recognition of home-caring as formal work, monetary recognition of home-carers and shared public responsibility of care in order to shape home-caring as a decent career option for all who are competent in it

Project Outcome (2)




- Difficulty for the interviewees to give detailed accounts of all the various home-caring reveals possible internalization of the society's devaluation, trivialization and oversimplification of their home-caring work
- Emotional labour has been identified as a major part of home-caring, but largely been trivialized

Project Outcome (3)



- Emotional cost of home-caring has been tremendously heavy, but have not be easily recognized. A new theorization on home-caring becomes necessary
- Sabine O'Hara (a feminist economist):
 "Care is not only indispensable to the
 economic process, it first make economic
 activity possible. Three concepts of care
 are considered. They are (1) rest, (2)
 restoration, and (3) recreation...All three
 types of care stress the need to consider
 the social, cultural and environmental
 context of economic activity rather than
 the economic process itself."





Project Outcome (6)



- Care becomes central and essential to sustain the services in the economic production.
- Social and environmental context systems of economic activity needs care to sustain and are included as the integral part of the economic process
- Emotional labour by care-givers to arrange for rest, restoration and recreation of family members is therefore regarded as part of the economy

Project Outcome (7)



- Sustaining nature of care and its sophistication demands a range of knowledge and skills, including those of high value, such as management and leadership skills
- Without naming the various competences or skills involved in care-giving, the conventional devaluation of home-caring cannot be reversed
- Self-care of care-givers in compensating for the emotional cost in care-giving may locate a space in the full cost accounting of the care economy

Project Outcome (8)



- Most participants have reflected more on their needs as home-carers, expressed more about their needs and changed some of their gender role expectations
- A public performance and exhibition to raise the awareness of the public on the needs and appeals of homecarers
- Two songs, a dance, a short-play, six Chinese ink and wash paintings, six acrylic paintings concerning women home-carers have been produced

Project Outcome (9)



- Most participants in art workshops have acquired basic skills, but need much more training for higher quality of productions:
- It depends heavily if the colleagues in charge from the respective organizations have already acquired former training to a level that can help to instruct the participants to practice the artistic skill for performance
- The need for instructor to guide the skills practice is critical in shepherding the participants to reach a quality public performance. Only one of our colleagues is competent to uptake such task
