Biography

Christine Wong is Professor of Chinese Studies and Director of the Centre for Contemporary Chinese Studies at the University of Melbourne. Prior to this, she was Professor and Director of Chinese Studies at the University of Oxford, where she was a Fellow at Lady Margaret Hall. Professor Wong has also taught on the faculties of the University of Washington, the University of California, Santa Cruz; University of California, Berkeley; and Mount Holyoke College.

Professor Wong's research focuses on China's public finance and public sector reform, including implications for governance, economic development and welfare. Over the past twenty years she has worked extensively with the World Bank, the OECD, and the Asian Development Bank, as well the IMF, UNDP, UNICEF, and the UK Department for International Development. She is a member of the OECD Advisory Panel on Budgeting and Public Expenditures.
