- "First, I gave scholarships to 170 students from the official and underground Church to go abroad.
- I have often had to travel to Rome and around the world. Since I've never asked for any financial aid to pay for such trips, I pay my own way.
- When I was the city's bishop, we helped dioceses hit by floods, tsunami, earthquakes, both in China and in other parts of the world.
- Then there is a long list of priests, nuns and bishops in China and elsewhere who received aid. If they come to Hong Kong, they can buy books as well as religious items and furnishings at my expenses."

# Case : Christian Zheng Sheng College

(正生書院事件)

- In Aug, 2009, local magazine published allegations that the (Zheng Sheng Association正生會) had investments valued at HK\$35.2 million in the mainland and Japan, some of which are said to be "questionable".
- The Association said that its investments in restaurants, tea houses, and farms serve as employment venues where its students can obtain work experience.
- Later, the school separated its accounts from its parent organisation (ZSA).
- On 22 March 2010, ICAC wrote a written statement to the college informing that ICAC didn't find any evidence of fraud or corruption. ICAC had ceased further investigation and closed the case.

# Existing laws deal with corruption and fraud

#### (2) Referring criminal offences to the appropriate law enforcement agencies

8.47 In case of possible criminal acts involved in the misconduct or mismanagement in the administration of the charity which come to light in the course of an inquiry, the future charity commission should have power to refer the case to appropriate law enforcement agencies.

9.24 In October 2009, the Independent Commission Against Corruption published its *Best Practice Checklist: Management of Charities and Fundraising Activities*.<sup>14</sup> In issuing these best practice guidelines, the Commissioner for the ICAC stressed that *"despite the relatively small number of complaints, the risk of corruption and other crimes involving management of charities and fund-raising activities should not be underestimated in view of the substantial donations made each year."<sup>5</sup>* 







## Case : Is Scientology a religion ?

- In 1999, the Charity Commission of UK refused its status as religion.
- In 2000, the Italian Supreme Court ruled that Scientology is a religion for legal purposes.
- In recent years, religious recognition has also been obtained in Sweden, Spain, Portugal, <u>Slovenia</u>, <u>Croatia</u>, Hungary, Kyrgyzstan.
- Other countries, notably Canada, France, Germany, Greece, Belgium refuse to grant Scientology religious recognition.





## 2. The Public Benefit Test ?



- Charitable organisations with tax exemption privileges should be accountable to the public
- Better board governance and transparent quality is needed
- "the benefit to the public should be capable of being proven, whether the nature of that benefit is tangible or intangible"



#### Christian Charities under Attacks (The Advancement of Religion for the Public Benefit)

- "It is possible that a charity existing exclusively to promote traditional Christian views in a particular area – such as marriage and sexual ethics – could have its charitable status questioned, or where proselytism is involved, especially overseas, evangelism methods may come under scrutiny."
- "Interpretation of the new guidelines cannot be easily divorced from developments in public policy generally and pressure is still likely to be encountered for faith based organisations to restrict their religious character and distinctives when they are seen to come into conflict with secular attitudes." (*The Evangelical Alliance*)





- Normally financial control confers power ("Those who pay decide") and there is much scope for using conditions of negative regulation to require religious bodies to adhere to particular principles and practices under the guise of quality control.
- Historically, the government has not intruded into the religious activities of religious charities.
   However, the Charity Law paved the way for the direct interference of the government in the activities and conduct of religious associations.







## Conflicting moral views



- "The Commission recognises that in many areas, including religion, opinions can be divided."
- "There will also be occasions where the moral views of organisations will conflict but it is possible for each to be charitable for the public benefit.
- e.g. The Right of Abode to foreign domestic helpers, 2011



# Conclusion Definitions of terms : charity, religion, public benefit etc. Fear of control from the powerful Charity Commission Loss of the Third Place Regulations make religious organizations losing vitality to serve the community (e.g. lump sum grant from SWD)



- When a religious scheme is shattered, it is not merely the vices that are let loose. The vices are, indeed, let loose, and they wander and do damage. But the virtues are let loose also; and the virtues wander more wildly, and the virtues do more terrible damage.
- The modern world is full of the old Christian virtues gone mad. The virtues have gone mad because they have been isolated from each other and are wandering alone. Thus some scientists care for truth; and their truth is pitiless. Thus some humanitarians only care for pity; and their pity (I am sorry to say) is often untruthful.
