## Launch Ceremony and Press Conference for "Jockey Club End-of-Life Community Care Project"

January 4, 2016

End-of-Life Care (EoLC) is also called palliative care or hospice care. It aims to improve the quality of life of patients and families facing the coping a life-threating illness in physical, psychosocial and spiritual aspects. As estimated by the World Health Organization (WHO), a total of 20 million patients need EoLC services every year. WHO Member States accepted a resolution on strengthening of palliative care unanimously in the annual meeting of May 2014. In Hong Kong, the number of deaths in 2014 was 45,710, which most of them were non-accidental death, and the overwhelming demand of EoLC services is foreseeable.

Hong Kong has started its formal EoLC services for patients with terminal illness since 1982. Nowadays, the EoLC services are still mainly focused on symptom control and provided by specialized medical team at hospitals. Whereas in Hong Kong, more than 90% of deaths happened in hospitals. However, around 300 EoLC beds are only provided by 16 hospitals across hospital clusters.

Hong Kong is facing a rapidly ageing population and the number of elderly will become 1/3 of the total population in 2050. Older adults usually have multiple chronic illness, thus there will be a growing demand of EoLC services. In the 2015 Quality of Death Index released by The Economist Intelligence Unit in October last year, Hong Kong was at the 22<sup>nd</sup> place with much room for improvement in comparing with our neighbouring cities, especially in community engagement and public awareness. How to enhance EoLC services and to provide comprehensive community support to patients and families become an important public health issue.

In view of the growing demand for EoLC services in the community, The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust approved HK\$131 million to launch a three-year initiative entitled "Jockey Club End-of-Life Community Care Project" (JCECC) in order to strengthen the community support to EoLC services. Through a multi-disciplinary, multi-institutional and cross-sectoral collaboration and innovative service models with cooperation between social and medical systems, JCECC aims at providing a holistic community support to patients with terminal illness and their families to improve their quality of life, enhancing the capacity of service providers by professional training, as well as raising public awareness by public education campaign. The Trust is collaborating in the project with the Faculty of Social Sciences of The University of Hong Kong, CUHK Jockey Club Institute of Ageing, and five non-governmental organisations (NGOs) including Hong Kong Association of Gerontology, Haven of Hope Christian Service, The Hong Kong Society for Rehabilitation, S.K.H. Holy Carpenter Church District Elderly Community Centre and St. James' Settlement.

A press conference will be held to brief press members on the programme.
