Dr Marcus Noland Executive Vice President Peterson Institute for International Economics

Dr Marcus Noland, who has been associated with the Peterson Institute for International Economics since 1985, is currently PIIE's executive vice president, director of studies. He is a senior fellow at both PIIE and the East-West Center. His research addresses a wide range of topics at the interstice of economics, political science, and international relations. His areas of geographical knowledge and interest include Asia and Africa where he has lived and worked, and the Middle East. In the past he has written extensively on the economies of Japan, Korea, and China, and is unique among American economists in having devoted serious scholarly effort to the problems of North Korea and the prospects for Korean unification. He won the 2000-01 Ohira Memorial Award for his book Avoiding the Apocalypse: The Future of the Two Koreas. He was educated at Swarthmore College (BA) and the Johns Hopkins University (PhD). In addition to a dozen of books, Dr Noland has written many scholarly articles on international economics, US trade policy, and the economies of the Asia-Pacific region. He has served as an occasional consultant to organizations, such as the World Bank and the National Intelligence Council, and has testified before the US Congress on numerous occasions.
