


Course Roadmap

The SPSPD programme is of interest to students who want to address challenges in social development, to engage in social innovation, and to strive for the betterment of human condition. We tackle social issues from an interdisciplinary perspective, with faculty expertise in social policy, social work, international development, and social statistics.

Our curriculum incorporates training in social innovation and social entrepreneurship, social development, behavioral economics, social research, and data analytics. Our students work with faculty who lead innovative, locally and globally cutting-edge research, including poverty dynamics and alleviation, social welfare policies, big data analytics in health and mental health, migration studies, and human trafficking.

Programme Highlights

CAPSTONE COURSE

SOWK4011 Capstone Project in Social Policy and Social Development

The capstone project is a compulsory course that major students take in their final year of study. It provides a platform for students to integrate what they have learnt in the curriculum, engage in independent study on a specific issue related to social development, and develop innovative strategies for tackling such an issue. Students can demonstrate their experiential learning and teamwork through the creative output of a group project and presentation to instructors and peers. Our students are encouraged to conduct their projects across a range of topics including:

- Community Development

- Medical and healthcare
- Social enterprise
- Social welfare services
- Any other innovative projects

COURSES IN LOCAL AND GLOBAL CONTEXTS WITH INTERDISCIPLINARY AND MULTIDIMENSIONAL APPROACH

The programme adopts an interdisciplinary and multidimensional approach, and introduces students to fundamental theories, models and debates related to various social policy domains and development strategies adopted in Hong Kong, the Asia region and in the global context, thus also carrying an international focus. It also focuses on the intersectionality of the social and the development aspects of policy and planning practice. Courses draw on established strengths in the SWSA Department in such areas as social policy, population and migration studies, community development, social enterprise, and non-profit management.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

With the incorporation of experiential learning (e.g. agency visits, study trips), students gain a wide latitude of perspectives on different issues, challenges and policy strategies related to social development at local, regional and international levels.

Career opportunities

This programme equips students with relevant and cutting-edge knowledge and skills in working across sectors: governments, communities, civil society, and the private sector, taking up such possible positions as government officials, policy researchers, analysts and advocates, NGO programme managers, social entrepreneurs, community organizers, journalists and more. A large selection of elective courses is provided for students to pursue their interested specialization in 'Social Policy and Social Development', 'Social Entrepreneurship & Social Innovation' and 'Social Data and Research'. This flexibility allows students to design their own curriculum to suit their individual academic and career aspirations.
