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Biography

Julie Greene is Professor of History, University of Maryland at College Park. She specializes in United States labor, immigration, and empire. Her research and teaching also engage with transnational and global approaches to history. She is the author of *The Canal Builders: Making America's Empire at the Panama Canal* (Penguin Press, 2009), The Organization of American Historians awarded *The Canal Builders* its 2009 James A. Rawley Prize for the best book on the history of race relations. Greene's recent articles include "Movable Empire: Labor Migration, U.S. Global Power, and the Remaking of the Americas," in *Journal of the Gilded Age and Progressive Era* (2016) and "The Wages of Empire: Capitalism, Expansionism, and Working-Class Formation," in Jana Lipman and Daniel Bender, eds., *Making the Empire Work: Labor and United States Imperialism* (NYU, 2015).

She was founding Reviews Editor in 2004 of *Labor: Studies in Working-Class History of the Americas*, and continues to serve as an editor of the journal. Greene served as President of the Society for Historians of the Gilded Age and Progressive Era in 2013-2015, and she is currently President of the Labor and Working-Class History Association. In 2011 Greene and Ira Berlin Co-Founded, and they now Co-Direct, the Center for Global Migration Studies at the University of Maryland, a center dedicated to generating knowledge of the history and politics of global migrations.
