Welcome to 'The Character of Leadership', an exciting collaboration between the Oxford Character Project and the University of Hong Kong's Faculty of Social Sciences, and Faith and Global Engagement Initiative.

For many centuries universities like the University of Hong Kong and the University of Oxford have played an important part in preparing leaders and thinkers who have held positions of responsibility around the world and shaped the future of society. The distinctive focus of this forum is the relationship between leadership and character, established on the conviction that personal character is central for the exercise of leadership that serves the good of society. There is no doubt that strategies and skills are important, but it is increasingly evident that these cannot guarantee good leadership. Our approach seeks to understand leadership as a personal category before it is a professional one, placing interpersonal relationships and character virtues at the heart of what good leadership is about.

The aim of the forum is not to pass on a discrete set of skills or impose a single perspective so much as to create a space for ongoing leadership formation, helping you to develop an approach to life and leadership that will enable you to grow as a good leader in both current and future roles.

The readings in this pack seek to draw on a variety of perspectives from different academic disciplines, cultural backgrounds, and vocational fields. Taking time to read them in advance of the forum and to complete the reflective exercises that accompany them will ensure you are well placed to make the most of the time we have together.
